



14th Sunday- Matthew 11:25-30

The readings of today invite us to reflect on peace and consolation through the Word of God. This word reveals to us and shows us that God is all powerful and mighty and yet is always accessible. He is the God who is our creator and all surpassing yet approaches us on intimate personal terms. He is our King says Prophet Zechariah in the first reading yet comes meekly riding on a placid donkey rather than on a prancing war horse. He is the new king whose arrival brings peace to the weary people. He has dominion from sea to sea, and yet he is concerned personally of each one of us. That dominion is expressed in today's Gospel when Jesus says "All things have been handed over to me by my Father." He reveals the Father to us and so we are swept up in the Holy Spirit into the intimacy between Father and Son as we ourselves become his sons and daughters in Jesus Christ. Jesus thanks the Father for granting the disciples the grace to grasp his teaching while keeping its meaning hidden from the so called wise and intelligent people of the day. At the same time he says that his yoke is easy and his burden is light and hence we must come to him in order to receive rest from him. In the second reading Paul reminds us that the spirit of God dwells in us. Christ's dominion is His victory over death, our intimacy with Him is the fact that the Spirit of God who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in us and him who raised Jesus from the dead will also give life to our mortal bodies by His indwelling in us. Thus when we think spiritually we are no longer burdened by the worldly ways because we are walking our living faith and hope with a spiritual heart. The Spirit enables us to overcome selfishness and live for God. Today we have the message from Jesus to come to him and receive the rest he alone can give. It is a call to a personal relationship. He takes us away from the impersonal relationship of law to a personal relationship of love and makes us enter a joyful life giving relationship. In coming to the person of Jesus we discover that far from being burdened, we are fully liberated. He invites us to place the yoke of ours on our shoulders and follow him. Normally any carpenter knows that if the yoke does not fit it hurts and leaves a painful mark. But the yoke of love which Jesus gives does not leave any wound or deep mark. It is a burden of love and it can never be painful. All of us surely remember the story of a small boy appearing out of the snow storm carrying a little boy on his back. When a compassionate person observed him and said: "that is a heavy load for you to be carrying." To which the boy replied, "He is not really heavy sir, he is my brother." In a similar way Jesus has carried the burden of ours personally and hence the very presence of his makes our burden light.

"For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." (Matthew 11:30)

When we think of being good stewards, we may think that God is asking too much of us when He calls us to generously share our time, talent, and treasure. However, we must remember that we are not "owners" of anything, we are merely "stewards" of the gifts God has given us. All He is asking is that we give back a small portion, in gratitude, of what He has already given to us.

Month of the Precious Blood


The month of July is dedicated to the Precious Blood. The feast of the Precious Blood of our Lord was instituted in 1849 by Pius IX, but the devotion is as old as Christianity. The early Fathers say that the Church was born from the pierced side of Christ, and that the sacraments were brought forth through His Blood.

"The Precious Blood which we worship is the Blood which the Savior shed for us on Calvary and reassumed at His glorious Resurrection; it is the Blood which courses through the veins of His risen, glorified, living body at the right hand of God the Father in heaven; it is the Blood made present on our altars by the words of Consecration; it is the Blood which merited sanctifying grace for us and through it washes and beautifies our soul and inaugurates the beginning of eternal life in it."

ACTIVIDADES PARA CATÓLICOS

NIÑOS EN CASA

Padres, no olviden que USTEDES son los catequistas principales y más efectivos para sus hijos. Las clases de Catecismo son solo una pequeña parte de su formación en la fe y dado que no podemos tenerlas en este momento, depende completamente de ustedes a enseñarles sobre su fe cada día.

- Establezca un espacio de oración en su hogar. Coloque una tela y artículos religiosos sobre una mesa (Biblia, agua bendita, velas, etc.), tal vez agregue una almohada en el piso para arrodillarse. Pídale que escriban las intenciones de oración y las coloquen en un tazón o jarrón sobre la mesa para colocar las intenciones.
- Enséñales cómo pasar un tiempo tranquilo simplemente "prestando atención" a lo que Dios quiere que sepan en sus corazones. Enséñales a cerrar los ojos, callar, respirar profundamente y concentrarse en Dios. Programe varias veces para esto todos los días y haga esto con ellos.
- Aprenda la oración del Padre Nuestro o Ave María en latín u otro idioma.
- Escuche y canten canciones católicas.
- Recen el rosario juntos en familia después de cenar cada noche.
- Prepare comida para un vecino anciano y entréguela o haga otra cosa amable por él. (Asegúrese de mantener al menos 6 pies de distancia por seguridad y lávese las manos mientras prepara algo)
- Haga una "Letanía familiar de los santos" ...avérgua quién es el santo patrón de cada miembro de la familia y llámalos al final de todas las oraciones (San Francisco, ruega por nosotros ... San José, ruega por nosotros ... etc.)
- Oren juntos en la mañana, en el mediodía y en la noche ... el Padre Nuestro, Dios te salve María, Gloria. Termina con "Jesús confiamos en ti".
- Lea los pasajes de la Biblia para la misa diaria y haga que los busquen en una Biblia. Pueden encontrarlos en "USCCB.org" o en la aplicación "Laudate".
- Vea videos sobre el Evangelio para el próximo fin de semana en www.pflaumweeklies.com/weekly-videos/
- Conéctese en línea y descubra quién es el Santo del Día, luego encuentre un video para niños sobre ellos en Youtube.
- Hay muchas ideas en www.loyolapress.com/our-catholic-faith/family/catholic-kids
- Busque fotos de personas en su familia celebrando su Bautismo, Primera Comunión o Confirmación.
- ¡Asegúrense que todos los días les digan cuánto los aman, y que Dios también los ama!
- Ayude a sus hijos a reconocer lo BUENO que Dios hace en nuestras vidas cada día. Ayúdelos a ver Su mano en TODAS las cosas ... incluso caminar afuera puede ayudar a ver la gloria de Dios revelada.



Activities for Catholic Children at Home

Parents, don't forget that YOU are the primary and most effective catechists for your children. CCE classes are only a small part of their faith formation and since we cannot have them right now it is completely up to you to teach them about their faith each day.

- Set up a prayer space in your home. Place a nice cloth and religious items onto a table (Bible, holy water, candles, etc) maybe add a pillow on the floor for kneeling. Have them write prayer intentions down and place in a bowl or vase on the table for the intentions to be placed in.
- Spend quiet time just "paying attention" to what God wants them to know in their hearts. Teach them to close their eyes, be silent, breathe deeply and just focus on God. Schedule multiple times for this every day.
- Learn the Lord's Prayer or Hail Mary in Latin or another language.
- Listen to and sing Catholic songs.
- Pray the rosary together as a family after dinner each evening.
- Make food for an elderly neighbor and deliver it or do something else kind for them.
- Make a "Family Litany of Saints" ...find out who the patron saint of each family member is and call on them at the end of all prayers (St. Francis, pray for us....St. Joseph, pray for us...etc.)
- Pray together morning, noon and night...the Our Father, One Hail Mary, Glory Be. End with "Jesus we trust in you."
- Read the Bible passages for daily mass and actually have them look them up in a Bible. You can find these at "USCCB.org" or on the "Laudate" app.
- Watch videos regarding the Gospel for the coming weekend at www.pflaumweeklies.com/weekly-videos/
- Go online and figure out who the Saint of the Day is then find a children's video about them on Youtube.
- There are lots of ideas at www.loyolapress.com/our-catholic-faith/family/catholic-kids
- Look for photos of people in your family celebrating their Baptism, First Holy Communion or Confirmation.
- Make sure they hear you say, every day, how much you love them and that God loves them too!
- Help your children recognize the GOOD that God does in our lives each day. Help them see His hand in ALL things...even a walk outside can help us see God's glory revealed.

SAINT OF THE DAY

Monday, July 6 ~ Saint Maria Goretti

Saint Maria Goretti has captured the love and affection of thousands of people because of the simplicity and purity of her life. Killed defending her chastity, Saint Maria Goretti posthumously witnessed the conversion of her murderer and his reconciliation with her family.

Thursday, July 9~ Saint Augustine Zhao Rong and Companions

Among the Chinese martyrs was a diocesan priest, Saint Augustine Zhao Rong, and his companions. Facing the strong anti-foreign and anti-Catholic feeling present in China at the time, these martyrs were caught up in a situation that, in many ways, had nothing to do with religion or the Church. But they stayed loyal to the Church and their people, and gave their lives.

Jueves, 9 de Julio~ SS. Agustín Zhao Rong, sacerdote y Compañeros, mártires chinos


Murió en Sichuan en un día indeterminado de la primavera de 1815, Agustín fue el primer sacerdote chino del cual se atestigua su martirio. Por deseo de Juan Pablo II, fue venerado en un grupo de 120, mártires en China entre 1648 y 1930, y canonizado durante el Jubileo del 2000.
